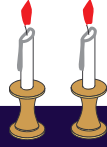

Something for the Shabbos table

When Yosef presented his two sons to Yaakov for a brocha, he placed his elder son on Yaakov's right, symbolic of strength and vigor, and the younger son beneath Yaakov's left. But Yaakov did something curious; שכל את ידיו (48:14). He crossed his right hand over his left, so that Ephraim, the younger brother, was beneath his right hand. But why not simply tell them to switch places? R' Chaim Volozhin explains that the nature of the average person is to brush away another person's positive attributes, yet he is ready to confirm or even exaggerate their negative traits. In this way, he looks good in comparison to the other people. Indeed, when two people face each other, one's left is the other's right and vice-versa. This alludes to the fact that his friend's right, or stature, stands opposite his left, generally the one seen as weaker; whereas his friend's weaker left side is opposite his right. Yaakov, the ultimate man of truth, was not one to detract or embellish any detail. He crosses his hands – the result being that his right hand corresponds with the boys' right and his left with theirs!

R' Moshe Shternbuch notes how meticulous care must be given when relating to the strengths and weaknesses of other people, being sensitive to the way they are spoken to, and about.
