Halocha from the Daf

The Gemorah in Kesubos Daf 17a brings the famous Machlokes between Beis Hillel and Beis Shammai in regards to the way one praises the Kallah. Beis Shammai says to Beis Hillel - If the bride was lame or blind does one declare that she is a beautiful and charming bride? The Torah said "Distance yourself from falsehood."

There are different opinions concerning one who lies in a way that causes no harm to others. Rabbeinu Yonah enumerates nine different categories of liars and the fourth category is one who while retelling a story knowingly changes some of the facts. Although no one is harmed by this lie it is nonetheless prohibited and it represents a love of falsehood which will eventually lead to testifying falsely.

In contrast, Teshuvas Hisorerus Teshuvah brings the Gemorah in Sukkah (46b) which teaches that one should not tell a child that he will give the child a gift and not follow through on the pledge since it trains one to lie. He explains that the Gemorah is not concerned about the child learning to lie but that the adult will become accustomed to lying. This indicates that the lie, in and of itself, is not prohibited and the only reason one should refrain from lying when it cause no one harm is that it develops bad character but not that it is prohibited.

The Sefer Yeraim writes that the only lie that is prohibited by the Torah is one that causes harm to others but if no one is harmed by the lie it is not prohibited. Accordingly, he questions the intent of Beis Shammai when they asked Beis Hillel why it is permitted to say that a bride is beautiful if she is objectively unappealing.

Something for the Shabbos table

When it came to the making of the Aron the Torah tells us וצפית אתוֹ זהב טהוֹר מבית ומחוץ תצפנו - And you shall cover it with pure gold on the inside and on the outside you shall cover it. The Gemorah tells us that Betzalel make three Arks, a golden Ark for the outside, another golden Ark for the inside, and a wooden Ark in the middle. Since there was gold on the inside and gold on the outside, what was the point in putting wood in the middle, surely the Aron could have been made of one solid big gold piece?

The Daas Zekeinim answers that if it would have been totally made of gold, it would have been too heavy to carry. From here we see an incredible insight into Hashem's attitude towards holiness. The Aron, which was the holiest object in the Mishkon, made to hold the broken tablets that Hashem created together with the tablets that Moshe carved, had to have a layer of wood instead of gold, to avoid causing difficulty to those who would have to carry it. The message is clear, even when it comes to holiness and religiousness, one must always consider how ones actions will affect the people around you.

This message was truly exemplified in the last years of Rav Yisroel Salanter's life, when he was too ill to supervise the Matzah baking in the city before Pesach. So, he sent some of his best students to supervise the entire process. Before they departed for the bakery, they asked their teacher which religious stringencies they needed to be careful about in their task. Rav Yisroel answered them "The woman who cleans the floors in between each baking is a widow, be careful how you speak to her."
