Halacha from the Daf

The Sefer Haterumos addresses the following case: A borrower owes money to his creditor and the only property he has to pay back the loan is a parcel of land that is worth more than the debt. If, however, the creditor was to take land proportionate to the money that he is owed, it would be a parcel of land too small for planting or anything else constructive. Sefer Haterumos rules that the borrower may not give the small parcel of land equal to the value of the debt against the will of the creditor. He gives the borrower two options; He could give the creditor a parcel of land that is large enough to be useful with the expectation that the creditor pay him for the additional land, or he must sell the land and with the proceeds of the sale pay back his debt with cash. He based this ruling on the Gemorah in Bava Basra 104b. The Gemorah relates that when the buyer was given more land than he paid for but the additional land was too small for anything constructive the seller is given the upper hand and does not have to accept a parcel of land that is too small. Instead the seller has the right to demand that the buyer give him money equal to the amount of extra land. If in the case of a sale of land the seller can demand money rather than land, certainly in the case of a loan the creditor can expect to be paid back in cash rather than receive a parcel of land that is too small to be productive.

Something for the Shabbos table

There is a fascinating midrash on the second posuk of our Parsha. The posuk relates Hashem's command to Moshe to tell the Bnei Yisroel that 'they should be holy, because I Hashem Your G-D am holy' (19;2). Why does the posuk speak about Hashem's holiness here?

Rav Henoch Leibowitz (Rosh Yeshiva, Yeshivas Chofetz Chaim) quotes a midrash on this verse (vayikra rabbah 249;9) which explains "you might think that you can be as holy as I (G-D) am, therefore the Torah says 'because I am holy;' My holiness is superior to yours." Rav Leibowitz points out the potent question here; the midrash has said that Hashem said 'for I am holy' in order that we should not make the mistake of thinking that we can equal Hashem's holiness - but would any human really feel that they can be on par with Hashem's holiness? Answers Rav Leibowitz that yes, indeed, if one were truly aware of their potential and ability to express and live in sync with their neshama, then indeed such a thought is possible. And to support this he quotes another midrash which notes that the angels initially thought that Adam HaRishon was G-D, and wanted to pay him homage until Adam pointed out their error. Finally, he cites that the Alter of Slabodka would say that it is within human capacity and capability to reach the pre-sin level of Adam HaRishon, as did occur when

the Jews accepted the Torah by saying naaseh venishma. In short, one's potential is indeed G-D-like to a certain extent, and we should be aware of that.
