## Halacha Corner

RECITING SHE'HECHIYANU DURING THE THREE WEEKS

The Shulchan Aruch (551:17) recommends that one refrain from reciting a she'hechiyanu on new clothing or fruits during the three weeks. The Magen Avraham (42) explains that since this period is a time of tragedy it is inappropriate to thank Hashem for allowing us to reach this time. The prohibition to recite a she'hechiyanu is not based on a prohibition of simcha, but actually reflects the very nature of the day.

#### **Buying something new**

Since it is prohibited to recite a she'hechiyanu one should refrain from any purchases that would require a she'hechiyanu (e.g. expensive clothing, cars etc.). Where the custom is to recite the brocha the first time the item is used, rather than at the time of purchase one may purchase the item during the three weeks. When purchasing a house it seems that one has the option of reciting the she'hechiyanu either at the time of the closing or the moving day. One of these days should be scheduled for a time outside of the three weeks to avoid an obligation in saying a she'hechiyanu during the three weeks.

It should be noted though, that there is no prohibition to recite a hatov v'hameitiv during the three weeks, and one may therefore make a purchase that will benefit a group of people (e.g. a family car – Igros Moshe OC III:80).

# Something for the Shabbos table

Rashi explains that after Pinchas killed Zimri, the Jewish people began to shame him by recalling the fact that his maternal grandfather (Yisro) had been an idolater. Therefore, the Torah specifically emphasizes his paternal descent from Aharon HaKohen. If the people knew of the law that zealots may kill one publicly engaged in such an act, why did they insult him? If they were unfamiliar with the law and viewed him as a cold-blooded murderer, of what benefit was it to Pinchas to point out his paternal lineage, and in what way did it change the reality that one of his grandfathers had served as a priest for idol-worship and that in their minds, he had needlessly killed the leader of a tribe?

Ray Meir Shapiro explains that the value of a mitzvah is measured by the degree to which its performance runs counter to one's natural inclinations and therefore represents a more difficult test of his devotion to Hashem. It is for this reason that the Akeidah is considered to be a test for Avrohom more than for Yitzchok. The central attribute of Avrohom's Divine service was chesed - kindness. while that of Yitzchok was gevurah – strength. The willingness to personally sacrifice one's own son to Hashem is difficult for any father, but its challenge was significantly more for one whose entire life was devoted to the trait of kindness, and it is for this reason that it is considered to be a unique test for Avrohom. The Jews attempted to minimize the greatness of Pinchas' act not by insinuating that he was a cold-blooded killer, but by hinting that it had come easy to him as a result of his being descended from an idolater who was accustomed to cruelly killing animals as part of his idol worship. The Torah therefore emphasizes that this act was indeed performed with great personal difficulty and internal resistance, as his natural instincts came not from his allegedly merciless maternal grandfather, but rather from his paternal grandfather Aharon HaKohen – a man whose entire life was dedicated to the love and pursuit of peace.
