Halocha Corner

Use of Hand Sanitizers on Shabbos

It has become common in our society to use hand sanitizers; as such, there is no prohibition of refuah on Shabbos even when used for obvious medicinal purposes. This is based on the ruling in the Shulchan Aruch (O.C. 328:37) that foods that are eaten or activities that are commonly performed by healthy people are permitted even when done for reasons of health.

Hand sanitizers come in various forms, including gels and liquids. Based on the Shulchan Aruch (O,C. 327), Rav Hershel Schachter has pointed out that applying olive oil or other substances of the same viscosity are permitted on Shabbos. Accordingly, the liquid forms (generally sprayed on) are clearly permitted on Shabbos. The gel raises the question of the melacha of memare'ach. It should be noted that many, if not most, of the products labelled as "gel" are in fact a liquid that pours, not thicker in consistency than olive oil and are not subject to the prohibition of memare'ach.

Those products which may be a true gel, and which have a noticeably thicker consistency, raise a concern. However, it is important to note that the Magen Avraham (O.C. 316:24, quoted by Mishnah Berurah 316:49) ruled that a thicker substance, if it is obliterated (i.e., it is rubbed into the skin so it does not leave a coating), is not subject to the prohibition of memare'ach. This ruling is also applied by Rav Ovadia Yosef regarding the use of toothpaste, and in a more universal way by Rav Shlomo Zalman Auerbach who ruled "that rubbing in the ointment until it is totally melted and absorbed into a person's skin is not considered memare'ach, as the prohibition is only when the ointment remains and one wants to leave a layer on the surface of his body." Accordingly, if a gel is thin and easily poured, it is viewed by the Halachah as a liquid and may be applied without any hesitation. In cases where there is a fear of communicable disease, and neither a liquid nor a thin gel is available, there is certainly room to permit the use of hand sanitizer, provided one was careful to fully rub it into the skin until it was no longer noticeable.

Something for the Shabbos table

"Moshe did not know that the skin on his face became radiant". When Moshe descended from Har Sinai, the Torah says that his face was shining with rays of light. These "rays of splendor" radiated from Moshe's face in such a glowing fashion that Moshe was forced to wear mask so that his people could look at him. The Midrash explains that Moshe merited such an honour from Above because when Moshe completed writing the Torah, a drop of ink remained in the container, so Hashem himself smeared the remaining droplet on Moshe's forehead. This drop of holy ink was the source of Moshe's "rays of splendor." However, the Midrash never actually explained what Moshe did to merit such a gift from Hashem. Furthermore, if the bottle of ink was divinely prepared, then Hashem would have prepared the exact amount of ink needed for the writing of a Torah, why would there be extra ink? The Ohr HaChaim explains that really Hashem prepared the precise amount of ink required, yet a morsel remained because Moshe was so humble that he did not want to write the possuk, "And the man Moshe was the most humble..." Instead, Moshe wrote the word "humble" (Anav) without the yud with which it is normally spelled. Similarly he made other words in the Torah shorter or spelled differently or with smaller letters such as the word vayikra having a small Aleph, all in order to keep His humility.

Therefore, the extra droplet of ink was a result of Moshe's humility in not spelling out the word "humble" completely. This extra droplet of ink was the source of Moshe's "rays of splendor."
